## Br ANTHONY SANGUINETTI 13 August 1824 – 4 October 1896



Born in Genoa (see photo), both Anthony's parents died before he was seven. What happened then we do not know but at some point he decided to go to England. He stayed in various cites – Norwich, Bury St Edmonds and others – and the one trade he picked up was in clock-making. But he kept close to the Church he was nurtured in and eventually found his way to applying

to the Society and being accepted in 1852.

Constantly busy, he did general work in a variety of places, for example, looking after the boys' dormitories at Mount St Mary's for sixteen years taking care of their linen, etc. He was asked to cook but could not manage. In 1868 he was in London and in 1872 he went to Stonyhurst. Sometimes he would work in the refectory or the sacristy.

In 1875 he came to St Aidan's where, presumably he did similar work. There is no mention of what he did. He was meticulous in trying to live the vows in the sense that his poverty of life was noticeable as was his obedience in little things.

He died of diabetes at Stonyhurst.
