SEPTEMBER 10 BLESSED FRANCIS GÁRATE RELIGIOUS OPTIONAL MEMORIAL

Francis Gárate was born in the hamlet of Recarte near Loyola (Guipúzcoa) in the year 1857 and, on completion of his elementary education, he went, in 1871, to do domestic work in the College of "Nuestra Señora de la Antigua," directed by the Jesuits at Orduña. In 1874, he entered the Society at Poyanne in France, and from 1877 till 1888 carried out the work of infirmarian and assistant sacristan in the College of St. James the Apostle in La Guardia (Pontevedra). Thereafter, for nearly forty years, right up to his death, he was doorkeeper at the University College in Deusto (Bilbao), where he was an example to all by his outstanding charity, hard work, courtesy, and other virtues. He died in 1929, and was enrolled among the Blessed by John Paul II in 1985.

I must say that the most precious memory of my time in Spain is that of the excellent Brother Doorkeeper of our University College of Deusto (Bilbao).

There was nothing remarkable in his outward appearance, but it was enough to exchange words with him even for a short time to realize that he was a man of deep Ignatian spirituality, endowed with outstanding virtues.

During my stay at Deusto, I would often stop in the porter's lodge, as I went in and out of the house, so as to be able to watch him in action. That entrance hall was a place of ceaseless activity: parents wanting to speak to their sons, all kinds of visitors asking to see the Fathers or the professors, tradesmen delivering their goods, beggars asking for alms. And all of them, as I saw for myself, were received or taken leave of with a gentle smile. He tried to satisfy each one's request; for everyone he had a courteous and friendly word and all this with truly remarkable serenity and calm.

What impressed me specially was the way in which, in the midst of all the turmoil, he was able to attend to the incessant ringing of the telephone, giving satisfaction to the callers and not keeping them waiting.

One day I asked him, "How are you able, Brother, to be involved in so many things and yet remain so calm, never losing your patience?" His reply was, "Father, I do what I can, and leave the rest to the Lord, who can do everything. With his help all is easy and pleasant, because we serve a good master." An answer worthy of a holy man of outstanding religious virtue.
